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GRAND CAYMANS...Price Reduced

For those interested in joining LABUE for the club trip to Grand Cayman Island from April 20-28, 2006, there is good news. Because of Delta Airlines' bankruptcy activities, the trip was switched to American Airlines. In the process, the airfare was reduced by more than \$200! The reduction lowered the trip price to \$1625 for divers (pp/double occupancy) and \$1325 for non divers. The final price will depend on the options selected. The trip is open and 20 members have already submitted deposits.

LABUE will spend 8 days and 7 nights on Grand Cayman Island, the largest of the three islands comprising the Cayman Island chain. The club will be housed at the Sunset House Hotel, the only resort in the Cayman Islands designed by divers, operated by divers, for divers. It is also the only hotel in the Cayman Islands which has its own coral reef with modern and ancient shipwrecks in shallow water right off shore. The package includes roundtrip airfare from Los Angeles, 7 nights accommodations (double occupancy), 5 days of 2-tank dives, unlimited shore diving, daily breakfasts and transfers.

The Cayman Islands are consistently rated among the top 10 dive destinations in the world, where underwater visibility is regularly in the 75-150ft range and can reach over 200ft. These islands have a huge variety of sea life and corals as well as some of the best wall diving in the world. Water temperature is reliably in the low 80's. With the availability of unlimited shore diving right on the premises, some divers will easily complete 20 dives or more during the 6 potential dive days.

The terms of the trip are included in the attached flyer. Anyone interested must submit a signed application along with a \$400 check. As with LABUE's previous trips, \$250 of the deposit is non refundable. If you are interested being part of an exciting week, act immediately as the trip will close prior to Thanksgiving.
